K. Dawn Rutledge Jones has more than 10 years of diverse experience in the media, marketing, public relations and events management. She has been a working journalist in print, radio and television and has taken on key communications roles in the non-profit, corporate, government and higher education sectors. Dawn has been a woman on the grow for quite some time. She was the youngest woman (at age 23) to oversee editorial content development for *The Tennessee Tribune*, the first woman to ever coordinate and manage the full-time marketing and public relations efforts for the 100 Black Men of Middle Tennessee, Inc. and was the first black female to take on a corporate communications role with FORTUNE 1000 company, Cracker Barrel Old Country Store, Inc. Dawn is also involved in numerous civic and service organizations, and is currently President of the National Coalition of 100 Black Women, Metropolitan Nashville Chapter. She is a graduate of the Young Leaders Council, Leadership Middle Tennessee, Leadership Nashville and the Jewell Jackson McCabe Emerging Leaders Institute. Dawn is also a 2004 nominee of the prestigious Nashville ATHENA Award, which recognizes women who excel to

leadership. She is a founding board member and former officer of the Nashville Black Chamber of Commerce, a former board member for Dress for Success Nashville, the Nashville Multi-Cultural Partnership and has worked with the Miss Black Tennessee Scholarship Pageant assisting contestants in polishing their public speaking and interviewing skills. Dawn frequently works with and speaks to groups on diversity and minority issues in the media and communications fields. She is committed to mentoring young people interested in pursuing careers in journalism and/or communications and has worked with the Nashville Association of Black Journalists, the Anthony J. Cebrun Journalism Center and Tennessee State University's Ida B. Wells Journalism Institute. Her hands-on approach has helped to influence young people to attend college and pursue a career in the field.

In a recent discussion with Dawn re: her interest in GROW, she comments on the game.

How often do you play? "While I don't have the opportunity to hit the greens as much as I would like, I have made it my goal to increase my involvement with GROW this year and take part in the opportunities that GROW provides to network and play with colleagues." Why are you interested in GROW? "I truly believe that women should network and support each another, and GROW provides an opportunity to do that. I am interested in GROW because it connects women with opportunity and friendships. In the midst of trying to balance family, demanding careers, finances and community, it is important to have a strong network of individuals with like interests and responsibilities who can relate to your situation. Additionally, GROW allows for a recreational activity that is fun and good exercise." Do you play for business, leisure, etc? "Since I don't consider myself to be a 'serious' golfer, I am most interested in the camaraderie developed from the game. But certainly if business opportunities happen to develop from that, then I see that as a bonus!"
